Tribute to a Community Supporter

Mary Hilworth – 1934 – 2014

Mary was born in Masset on Haida Gwaii on Sept. 22, 1934. She and her family moved to Vanderhoof, BC in 1941, where she spent 11 years before moving to Blue River, BC at the age of 18.

Arvon and Mary Carpenter met in Blue River in 1953 where Mary was employed as a waitress in the "Beamery". Mary worked at Beanery in Jasper until 1954. Mary and Arvon were married in 1954 and in due course came David in 1956, John in 1957, Susan in 1959 (deceased), Gary in 1960 and Patricia in 1962. David, John, Gary and Patti received their education in the Jasper school system. During their growing up years they were all active at one time or another in Minor Sports – particularly hockey, Scouts and Brownies. Mary and Arvon were involved also as leaders and coaches.

Previous homes were upstairs of the log house at 217 Bonhomme Street, basement of 106 Patricia Street and a little white house at 319 Geikie Street. They moved into 100 Patricia Street in 1960 as renters and bought it a couple years later.

Mary was greatly involved in the Canadian Daughters, Girl Guides and Scouts, curling, hiking, gardening and watching her children and grandchildren in all of their various activities. She was president of the Seniors Society in later years and active throughout her life in all aspects of the community.

Arvon retired from CNR in 1985. He and Mary continue to make their home in Jasper, where they pursue their many hobbies. Jasper will always be the place that the Hilworths call home. The mountain welcomed each of them as they arrived and will be the tether that holds them or pulls them for a visit for many years to come.

Mary is survived by her husband Arvon, her children; David(Laura), John(Verna), Gary(Tamar) and Patricia(Mark), her grandchildren Danielle, Robin, Jacob, Hannah, McKinley, Rikkilee, Jack, Hayden, Cooper and Nash and her great grandchildren McKenzie and Saxon. Mary is also survived by her sister Rosalie (Walter) and her brother Bill (Louise) and many nieces, nephews and cousins near and far.

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road to the school. Murdock Bowen of Jasper Construction was contracted to do the trenching, and he was prepared to donate any further trenching that we would require.



Conversations with various stakeholders, including at the ministerial level of several government departments appeared to be bearing fruit. Grande Yellowhead and Clark Builders supported the concept, as further trenching would have been necessary to connect to the fibre optic backbone under the path by the school playground south east of the new school. Axia, the operators of the Supernet fibre optic network, sent a technician to look over our site and consider logistics of hook-up. Axia was going to supply the cable and connectivity in exchange for publicity and other considerations.



Well.....after some quiet inactivity, we discovered that the gentleman with whom we were dealing was



no longer an employee, and it turns out his supervisors had been unaware of commitments he was discussing. An appeal to Service Alberta, the owner of the network, made through our MLA Robin Campbell, produced sympathy but they had no control over the decisions of a private business. Representatives did commit to assisting the JYHS in helping the initiative in some other ways....

So . . . lessons learned, hopefully. And as well, we do have the offer of expertise from Service Alberta to still move forward on the technology front. Stay tuned!

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In my first 3 months as manager, I have been humbled to work with such passionate and caring individuals who give selflessly of their time and energy to make the museum work, and celebrate Jasper's unique history. The staff and volunteers radiate support and enthusiasm. It has been this kind of support and enthusiasm which has repaired a leaky roof, fixed other much needed repairs, hosted successful historical outings and hikes, transformed the front garden, put up a bat house (generating a high amount of interest for bat conservation from the public), endless fundraising, and assisted in caring for the archives and collections.

Likewise, despite spending the summer surrounded by a construction zone, we have received many visitors from all over the world. Among them were former senator and general Romeo Dallaire, judges for the Communities In Bloom competition, and many others. And what do they have to say about our museum? While the Jasper Yellowhead Museum & Archives may be small, with an aging building and facing other challenges, many visitors come here and are in complete awe of what we have to offer. They notice the heart of this institution. They notice the care and sincere friendliness that comes from the community. And they notice our connection to and the showcasing of this area's incredible past.

For example, in July I assisted a gentleman from Victoria research his long deceased relatives who used to live and work in Pochontas. Within minutes our archives found him the exact information he was looking for, and as he spent the next 2 hours looking through old photographs of his relatives and read their hand written letters, he noticeably held back tears on more than one occasion. For him the connection he achieved could not be found elsewhere, and he generously thanked us in return. We also currently have a Ph.D student from the University of British Columbia looking to do research here over the next year. He described us as a "goldmine" of information.

In conclusion, my first 3 months at the museum have been spectacular. Not only have I reconnected with friends old and new, but I have felt the warmth of this community and its commitment to the museum. And now as the summer wanes, I look forward to the coming months and years ahead. This place tells stories, and it's the passion of hardworking people which keep these stories alive. Jasper is a small town with a seemingly never ending stream of newcomers, though it is full of passionate people, and I am confident that with the team spirit and giving nature of the community, the Jasper Yellowhead Museum & Archives will continue to thrive and meet its challenges in the time ahead. I thank you all for the support I have received and the opportunity to stand outside this small, but hard hitting museum, and finally call Jasper home.


